#### Helicopter alert over anglers

An RAF helicopter from Leconfield on patrol in Bridlington Bay was alerted by coastguards who saw what they thought were two groups of people cut off by the tide at Flamborough South Landing and Danes Dyke.

The helicopter found two groups of anglers fishing from the rocks, who were able to get ashore without difficulty.

#### 'Copter saves anglers

A PARTY of anglers on a fishing trip in the River Humber — including two disabled men — had to be rescued by lifeboat and helicopter after the vessel carrying them started taking in water and was in danger of sinking.

The incident happened around tea-time on Saturday when the vessel Ranger, sailing out of Barrow Haven, took a party of seven Leeds anglers, and two crew, into the river.

When the vessel started taking in water, the crew radioed for help before beaching at Paull Sands, opposite East Halton.

When the helicopter from RAF Leconfield arrived, the situation had worsened and there was worry for the safety of the two disabled men. One was blind and the other had only one leg, and it was thought they would have difficulty clambering aboard the Humber Lifeboat which arrived on the scene.

Once the two had been winched aboad the helicopter, the remaining five anglers were taken off the Ranger by lifeboatmen and were later landed safely in Grimsby. The two-man crew remained aboard to repair

The local lifeboat crew were alerted, as was an RAF helicopter on exercise nearby, but neither were needed as the canoeist was swept ashore by the large rollers.

Bridlington coastguards went to the scene, but found Mr Keys of North Road, Anlaby Road, unhurt.

A RAF HELICOPTER from Leconfield was diverted from a routine training exercise yesterday when a canoeist was thought to be in trouble off Pridlington's south beach
