Leconfield helicopter rescuers notch up 100 scrambles this year

Milestone for mercy fliers

AN RAF search and rescue quadron has chalked up a nilestone in mercy missions.

For the first time since 202 quadron started operating the ervice from Leconfield, near Beverley, in 1957, its helicopters ave scrambled a hundred times

The latest rescue happened late n Sunday.

A call from the rescue cordination centre at Pitrievie in scotland scrambled one of econfield's two Wessex helicopers and its three-man crew.

The Finnish supertanker finney had radioed that Ms. Marina Viitanen, 24, who works in he engine room, had suspected

The tanker, which was on its vay from Immingham to Rotterdam, was intercepted near the Humber light vessel, 38 miles

The winchman, Sgt. Terry Williamson, was lowered to the deck, as the pilot, Fl. Lt. Hugh Pierce and Master Navigator Ron Dedmen, held the helicopter over

the ship's deck.

Ms. Viitanen was lifted aboard and flown to Hull Royal Infirmary where, last night, she was said to be satisfactory.

Within 99 minutes of being alerted, the Wessex and its crew were back at base.

Since the flight was formed, Leconfield helicopters have responded to 2,237 scrambles and have rescued 1,478 people.

The crews' task is highly demanding and requires constant training to enable them to retain their highest level of efficiency.

When founded, the rescue team used Bristol Sycamore helicopters.

These were replaced by Whirlwinds three years later. The present Wessex machines were introduced in August, 1981, and have become a familiar sight over East Yorkshire.

Leconfield is one of nine search and rescue flights scattered throughout the British Isles and it covers an area bounded by Teesside, Lancaster, Birmingham and the Wash, and up to 120 miles out over the North Sea.

The unit's main role is to assist aircraft in distress but, in reality, the majority of work is in support of civilian organisations such as coastguards, mountain rescue services, the lifeboats, the merchant and fishing fleets, and the police and ambulance services.

The flight has 46 personnel, comprising 11 aircrew and 35 ground crew.
